Elsewhere we saw birds galore, hiked islands occupied only by the local flora and fauna, waved at our hotel as we rounded El Arco at Cabo San Lucas, and totally

You better believe this one’s now on our musical résumé!

**Quirkiest:** And now to the far(thest) end of the spectrum: the World Beard and Moustache Championships, held this year in downtown Portland. Here’s the conversation:

So we traipsed the sidewalks of downtown Portland with a couple hundred fancy beards and moustaches in tow while rocking out in our usual uninhibited fashion. And we had a tremendous time. The Grand Opening Parade had nearly 20 performing groups from around the world and was telecast to 200 million viewers. It's the only parade we've ever done that required a 7-hour rehearsal

the previous night. Band members described our time in the staging area with the other groups as "just like being in the Olympics."

Altogether we did four shows in Shanghai, including the Oriental Pearl TV tower, the biggest mall in Shanghai,<sup>22</sup> and a "mini-parade" along

Nanjing Road consisting of ... just us!<sup>23</sup>

Our China itinerary included the "smaller" city of Suzhou,<sup>24</sup> which is one of Portland's "sister cities." We thought it would be fun to do a show there, and our hosts said they'd set it up. When the buses arrived in Suzhou, we discovered our name in lights on a 40-foot billboard. Steve even starred in a 60 second spot on the Suzhou evening news.<sup>25</sup> Everywhere we went, the crowds treated us like rock stars— just an amazing performing experience.

Got to do the touristy things too: silk, jade,

pearls, tea plantation, temples, a night cruise on the Huangpu River, acrobat show – our days were definitely packed. Our final stop was three days in Beijing where we saw Tian'an Men Square and the Forbidden City, rode rickshaws through the old part of the city, and feasted on Bei-

jing duck. On our last day we visited the Great Wall. "Sometimes people perform on the Wall; would your band like to do that?" Only one correct answer to that, so we did 20 minutes of American pop to bemused Chinese tourists who

wondered what planet we called home. Talk about an item on the bucket list!

Though China wasn't a place we had considered visiting, we had a great time and highly recommend a visit of your own. If you go, whatever you do, DON'T DRIVE! The road is filled with cars, bikes, scooters, pedestrians, aardvarks, & penguins. OK, those last two were made up, but the roads are so busy that they might be there...

### The Road Home (Ahh...)

At home throughout the year, we pursued our other usual (and not so usual) activities.

For reasons we just can't fathom, we are still playing softball. Our team (Who's On First?) finished its worst season ever winning just one game when the other team (obviously stunned by our rumored prowess) didn't show up.
