The band took a few out-of-town trips during 2024 & 2025. In 2024, we went to New Westminster, BC for the Hyack Festival and were awarded the Mayor's Trophy for "exceptional performance".⁴ We also traveled to San Francisco for the Italian Heritage Festival, where the Blue Angels performing overhead *during* the parade were so loud we couldn't hear ourselves play.⁵

In 2025, we headed to Galveston, TX for two Mardi Gras parades, each of which took us around the parade route twice. We capped off our travels with the fabulous floats of the Palm Springs Festival of Lights parade in December, where we were named "Most Spirited Overall Marching Band".⁶ While in the area we enjoyed a day tour of the unique geological formations and tree-like succulents of Joshua Tree National Park.

The band played its annual holiday concert in Pioneer Courthouse Square both years. This year featured Janet's debut on the agogo bells⁷ for one tune. It was a stunning success.⁸ On sax, she now has 21 marching band tunes memorized and plays through a few of them each

It's been quite a ride. In its 14 seasons the band has performed in 10 states, 7 foreign countries, aboard 2 cruise ships and across four continents. We've done 253 parades and 331 standstills on 444 performance days. That's one gig every 11.5 days for 14 years including downtime during the pandemic.

Music Project

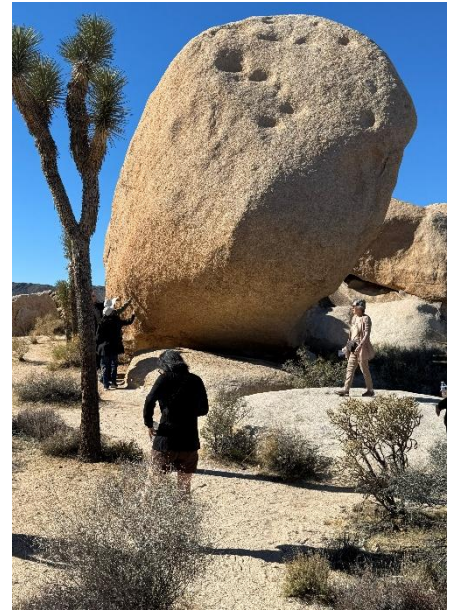
A couple of years ago, Janet decided she wanted to find the music for

Killian Concert March, a piece composed for her high school by Clifton Williams, a well-respected composer. If you've played much classical wind

band music you may have played his pieces (e.g., *Symphonic Dance #3* and *The Sinfonians*).

Now you might ask yourself why a well-respected composer would write a piece for a high school band. Clifton Williams was a professor at the University of Miami. His daughters played in the Miami Killian Senior High School band – as did Janet. Williams was active in the music band parents association.

In addition to writing the words and music to our alma mater, he composed the Killian Concert March. He came to Janet's band class and worked with them on the piece.

Finding the music for this was challenging. Janet tried checking in with her high school and the University of Miami -- no luck. She persisted and finally found the piece from a classmate who is a band director and had most of the parts. She took a long shot and found the rest of the parts from a school in Texas that had performed the piece around 2010. Unfortunately, the parts we got weren't in the best shape so Steve put the parts in Finale (a music program). We spent a *lot* of time proofreading to get the parts right.

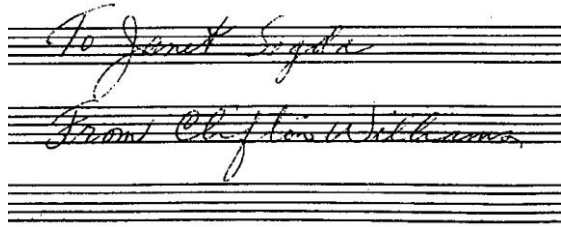
We shared the Finale file with a few people, including the director of PCWB, and performed it at our spring concert. Janet shared the link to the concert recording with Killian band classmates on the PCWB Facebook page. They loved hearing it performed and the classmate who sent her the parts conducted it at a concert.

But wait – that's not the end of the story. Janet discovered that many of the original messy parts included hand-written dedications from Clifton Williams to the student who played that part. So the Alto Sax 2 part had the dedication from him

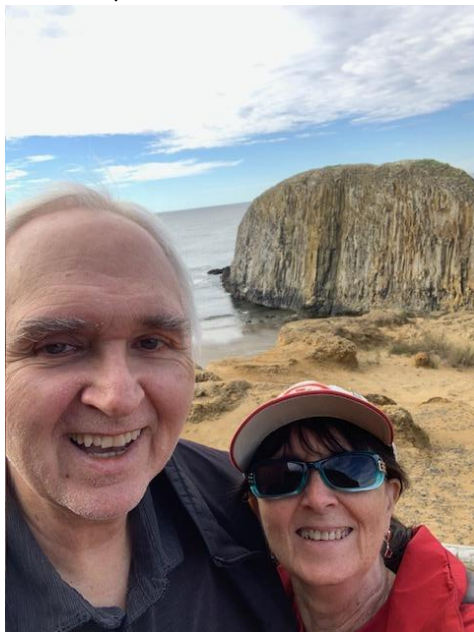

The Eyes Have it!

Here's a crazy story. In around November/December 2024, Janet's contact lens 'disappeared' while she was sitting at her desk. She went to the optometrist to see if he could find it—no luck. So a new lens was ordered. She kept 'feeling' it in her eye but could never find it. She chalked it up to

being a hypochondriac and decided to ignore the sensation. While in Florida in January 2025, she felt it more than usual. She pulled up her eyelid and that sucker dropped down and centered itself! It had been up there for about 6 weeks! When she went her eye exam, her optometrist was surprised and a little disap-

pointed that he had been unable to locate it. Oh, well.

While at her annual eye exam, she noted that her left eye seemed noticeably worse than the right. Her optometrist told her he could not help her with her vision and that it was time for cataract surgery. If you understand diopters, think around 9-12 and you might get how nearsighted she is. You see that big E on the wall at the optometrist's office? Janet doesn't.¹¹

She was referred to NVision which was a great clinic. She opted for what's called light adjustable lens implants for the surgeries. After the lenses are implanted, the vision is tweaked with UV light in 3-5 treatments. After those treatments, two more light treatments are done to lock in the vision.

Until the vision was locked in, Janet had to wear UV light blocking glasses to avoid inadvertently changing the vision in the lenses. The results were great and she doesn't need glasses for anything.

Do you do anything without a band present?

We kicked off 2024 with a visit to Florida. We got to spend a few days with Janet's aunt and cousin. Then we headed for the Orlando area to spend a few days with Steve's brother and family. This was the first time we made it to Florida since before the pandemic. It was great to see everyone!
